ACSA offers a discounted fee for Modules 2 and 3:

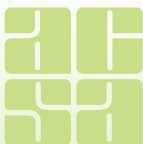

acsa's ab 430 administrator training program

what is it?

AB 430, the Administrator Training Program, is the reauthorization of AB 75. AB 430 provides funding to school districts and other local educational agencies (LEAs) to train principals and vice principals in the skills and knowledge necessary for their critical and complex roles as instructional leaders. This training addresses the leadership, infrastructure, and support for full implementation of effective instructional programs to improve student achievement.

who benefits?

Training is available to, and highly encouraged for, all school administrators, eg. principals and vice/assistant principals (full- or part-time), employed in public schools (kindergarten through grade twelve inclusive).

Training is required for school administrators of schools participating or involved in the:

- High Priority School Grant Program
- Reading First Grant Program
- School Assistance and Intervention Team (SAIT) process

Training is strongly recommended, and high priority is given to, school administrators assigned to, and working in:

- Low performing schools, eg. schools in the bottom half of all schools based on the API rankings, or
- Hard-to-staff schools, eg. schools in which 20 percent or more of the teaching staff hold emergency permits or credential waivers.

what does it cover?

AB 430 training addresses the following six required areas:

- School financial and personnel management
- Core academic standards
- Curriculum Frameworks and Instructional Materials
- The use of pupil assessment instruments, specific ways of mastering the use of assessment data from the Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program, and school management technology to improve pupil performance.
- Instructional leadership and management strategies
- Extension of knowledge, skills, and abilities acquired in the preliminary administrative preparation program

is it a tier II credential pathway?

AB 430 training is an approved pathway for Tier II credentialing. Certification of the completion of all AB 430 training components may be submitted to fulfill Tier II credential requirements.

how is it organized?

AB 430 training is organized into three modules:

- Module 1 – Leadership and Support for Student Instructional Programs
- Module 2* – Leadership and Management for Instructional Improvement
- Module 3* – Instructional Technology to Improve Pupil Performance

what is required?

AB 430 training requires 80 hours of Institute training and 80 hours of follow-up Practicum within a two-year period. The training requires the following:

Module	Institute	Practicum
1	40 hours	40 hours
2*	20 hours	20 hours
3*	20 hours	20 hours

Certification of Institute hours may only occur as a result of actual attendance at all required training hours.

who pays for it?

Incentive funding is provided for AB 430 training from the CDE. School districts, not individuals, may apply for AB 430 funding through the Management System for Administrator Training (MSfAT) at www.ab430training.org/. Funding is available at the rate of \$3,000 per eligible participant. Information regarding the application period for funding appears on the MSfAT web site.

Participating school districts are required to provide \$1,000 in local matching funds for each principal trained, and up to \$500 for each vice principal trained. Any combination of local, federal, or private resources or contributions may be used for the matching fund contribution. In-kind contributions may not be used for the district's match.

It is the district's responsibility to provide and monitor the matching funds. No portion of the matching funds will be collected or monitored by ACSA.

what does acsa provide?

ACSA is a State Board of Education (SBE)-approved AB 430 training provider. ACSA offers training for Modules 2 and 3.

Upon certification of the completion of all training requirements, ACSA provides each participant with a letter and certificate of completion for Modules 2 and 3.

For participants to complete all three modules of AB 430 training, ACSA will assist in identifying approved providers for Module 1. Agencies contracting with ACSA for Modules 2 and 3 will need to contract separately with an SBE-approved provider of their choice for Module 1.

ACSA frequently partners with county offices of education (COEs) who are authorized to provide Module 1 training.

who can contract with acsa?

ACSA is actively pursuing the opportunity to provide AB 430 services for the following types if agencies:

- Individual school districts who would have at least 20 participants
- Consortia or groups of school districts who collectively would have 20 to 30 participants
- County Offices of Education who would organize regional trainings and would have 20 to 30 participants
