State Update

State Budget Overview

- Governor Jerry Brown releases 2017-2018 General Fund budget proposal January 10. Based on updated figures, Brown will release May budget revision. Lawmakers must provide the governor with a balanced budget by June 15 for his signature.
- General fund budget proposal of \$122.5 billion.
- \$73.5 billion Proposition 98 guarantee. The proposal is \$2.1 billion increase from 2016-2017 Fiscal Year budget.
- \$744 million for LCFF implementation. Funding maintaining implementation at 96 percent. Also included is \$287 million in one-time discretionary block grants.
- This is the smallest investment in LCFF since the launch of the localized initiative. In 2016-2017, the budget allocated \$2.9 billion for LCFF implementation and \$1.4 billion one-time discretionary block grants.
- A per-pupil funding increase of \$331.

Accountability

- California's new accountability system will be based on multiple measures and moves away from the decades-old single summative index.
- Considers schools' current performance (status) and improvement over time (change).
- The current school year serves as a transitional year to when the new system is fully operational in 2017-2018
- Technical assistance, support, and interventions under LCFF and ESSA will not be implemented until the 2018-2019 school year.
- ACSA formed Accountability and Continuous Improvement Task Force to provide input, guidance, and recommendations to the State Board of Education.

LCFF Evaluation Rubrics/California School Dashboard

- The new accountability tool, known as evaluation rubrics, is now called the California School Dashboard. The dashboard is required by the LCFF to assist LEAs with identifying strengths, weaknesses, and areas in need of improvement across all eight LCFF priorities.
- The dashboard will include pre-populated student performance data on the state indicators.
- Educators will receive access to the dashboard and communications resources by February.
- The launch for the public is tentatively scheduled for March.

Facilities

- Proposition 51 raised \$9 billion for K-Community College school facilities. \$7 billion allocated to K-12 facilities.
- Approximately \$2 billion in unfunded projects at the Office of Public School Construction will likely be the first priority for funding once bonds are sold.
- The legislature is prohibited from making changes to the program, but reforms can be made through policy and regulation changes.
- Legislation will be introduced to require facility bond expenditures be included in the annual K-12 Audit Guide. The Brown administration plans on revising some policies and regulations for districts requesting funding through the State School Facilities Program.
- The administration will work to revise policies and regulations to "implement front-end grant agreements that define basic terms, conditions, and accountability measures for participants that request funding through the School Facilities Program."
- Indications are bonds likely won't be sold till after June.

Pensions:

- In December, the CalPERS board unanimously voted to lower its assumed rate of return from 7.5 percent to 7.0 percent.
- Given political realities of an increase, ACSA
 Governmental Relations team advocated mitigating
 the impact: no changes to the rate below 7 percent;
 any changes should not go into effect during the
 2017-2018 budget year; consider a phase-in of new
 rates over three years.
- Preliminary numbers would have raised CalPERS employer contribution rates by 20 percent for 17-18 year.
- ACSA is well aware of budget pressures on districts and the Governmental Relations team is exploring all options to mitigate the impacts.

Federal issues:

- School choice will be a priority for the new secretary and new chair of the House Education and Workforce Committee. President Trump's proposed \$20 billion funding for choice will likely be difficult to get through the fiscally conservative Congress.
- Expected roll-back of ESSA proposed regulations returning more authority back to states and districts.
- Congressional priorities will be reauthorization of the Higher Education Act, reauthorization of Carl Perkins Act and reauthorization of the Child Nutrition Act.
- Reauthorization of IDEA is currently not on the list of Congressional priorities.
- Still unknown is whether the Trump administration will revoke the executive order for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA). Uncertainty remains what immigration reforms across the board will be.
